When gathering people together and sparking relationships is the core of what you do, the pandemic and social distancing is truly a curveball.

This March, we transitioned many of our services to a virtual format or connected via phone while temporarily halting in-person gatherings to comply with the Governor's mandate.

Despite our new technologyloaner program, barriers to technology still exist for many members. And compliance with public-health guidelines for an organization like ours remains challenging, with ambiguous and continually evolving standards.

But amid so much uncertainty, relationships are the one thing that truly brings us together (even if remotely), inspires joy, and allows us to create change.

We all long to feel cared for, loved, and valued. And yet many of our members experience marginalization by society.

It's hard not to internalize these messages when you hear them frequently – and the feelings of exclusion or devaluation can become a barrier to relationships.

COMMUNITY ROOM

A larger Community Room is essential for a safe reopening to ensure more space between members when they're sitting and talking. While we are limited to the building's physical footprint, the Community Room will increase by 1,000 square feet, and gain additional usable space by reconfiguring the room's flow.

CLASSROOM & VOLUNTEER AREA

While larger spaces are critical in COVIDtimes, even before the pandemic, our existing classroom often wasn't large enough to accommodate programming like choir.

And if you've ever been a volunteer or attended an event on that side, you'll be excited to hear that we're adding another entry door and a bathroom, so volunteers will not have to traipse all the way back through the other building!





Thanks to you, and a lifetime love of singing, Janie found "another family" with our choir in 2019, after moving cross-country with just two suitcases.

During COVID, Janie keeps connected by sharing her colorful personality and sense of humor during virtual choir and weekly calls with a cherished friend she met at her first choir practice.

Treasuring friendships

How did you first get connected with Maybelle?

I've been singing since I was five, in the school and church choir. I just sing my heart out. That's me - that's what I do. I even joined a ladies' barbershop quartet!

When I moved into my apartment, I didn't really talk to too many people. I met a Maybelle Center volunteer who said, "Did you know Maybelle Center had a choir?"

When I came to choir the first time, I was scared for a little bit. But everybody introduced themselves and made me feel really comfortable.

How have you stayed connected during the pandemic?

That first day in choir, I got connected to Jackie [a fellow choir member], and we started talking. Jackie and I now talk every Wednesday to keep in touch with each other. Jackie also helped me use Zoom, so I could go to remote choir practice.

I also generally talk to Cecily [Maybelle staff] once a week. Whenever I talk to Cecily, it's like I'm talking to my sister. I keep her entertained. I get her laughing and she can't stop. I'm always hoping she's not falling off of her chair!

& bursting with song

Residents at MacRes love your pup. Can you tell us about her?

Lola's not like any other dog she's been a wonderful blessing for me. Last year, we started visiting the Residence (Assisted Living at Maybelle) on Fridays. I loved it.

I'd say, "Okay, Lola, we gotta go see your friends, and she would pull me all the way there. Because of COVID, Lola can't go see her friends at the Residence. And now I have a pouty dog on my hands!

"When I was growing up, I had an abusive family, and wasn't allowed to have any friends. Having friends now is really cool - I got people checking on me all the time and making sure I'm okay. That makes me feel good."

Unfortunately, sharing our voices in an enclosed space also shares COVID-19

During the pandemic, the Maybelle Community Singers resumed practices virtually and worked towards a virtual "performance" by blending recording from each choir member into a unified sound.

I'm the kind of person who you know you can count on in a pinch. I was raised to give the shirt off your back if you can - that's just me. I make it easy for people to sit there and talk; if you need someone to talk to, I'm the one.




Surely there's others who feel as I do! Inside my walls can I know this is true? My walls cry out. Does someone hear? Please find ways to know me this year.






We run on lean budgets, imagination, sweat & laughter (sometimes tears)


